Three tries were scored in the last five minutes by Alexa Smith, Watson, a solo run from about forty-five metres, and Ellie Williamson. The first two were converted by Irving. The referee blew for no side with a scoreline of Ayr Ladies 19 West of Scotland Ladies 53.

The reaction of players and coaching staff at the end of the game showed just how important this victory was. After two games of the new season, West have the maximum ten points, Kelso having failed to fulfil last week's fixture with West. Their next game is a week on Sunday, 19 September. Annan Ladies will visit Burnbrae. As well as league points being at stake, the West girls will be looking for revenge over the only side to defeat them in the 2019/20 season.
